# Kappa Kappa Kappa Exceeds Programming Expectations For Two Consecutive Terms

Tri-Kap programming has recently taken a new turn under the leadership of Sean Heikkila '02. After years of merely passing our programming standard reports, Tri-Kap has finally surpassed the expectations of the Coed, Fraternity, Sorority (CFS) programming standards. For the past two terms (summer 2000 and fall 2000), Tri-Kap has taken its programming to a higher level, one that merits being assigned a grade of "exceed."

Especially impressive is the house commitment to community service. Since summer 2000, Tri-Kap has consistently logged over 300 hours of service per term. These hours come from the brother's involvement in service projects like Habitat for Humanity, Students Fighting Hunger, COVER Home Repair, Red Cross Blood Drive, Operation Insulation, Help Is On The Way, Rivendell Boys Mentoring, the Elderly Life Program, Children's Hospital at Dartmouth, Prison Project, and the Cultural Extravaganza. In addition, brothers have used their personal aptitudes to benefit the Upper Valley community. Beginning September 2000, brothers Benjamin Frischhertz '02, Sean Heikkila '02, Mark Perez '02, and Michael Salzman '02 coached a soccer team of seventh and eighth graders. This new movement toward service leadership is one of the new goals of Tri-Kap.

Equally notable is the plethora of intellectual events held at Tri-Kap. In November 2000, the house invited Dr. Mark Reed and Margaret A. Smith to give a talk entitled "Brain + Drugs = ???" The purpose of the talk was to supplement the lack of focus on drugs in the new member education curriculum. A special emphasis was put on Ecstasy because of its mainstream use in the "clubbing" scene. In February 2001, Tri-Kap and the AIDS Workcrew collaborated to bring a Living with AIDS discussion. It featured a woman named Peggy who is living with HIV and is a widowed mother with two teenage children. She has been living with the virus for many years. For the past seven years she has worked for the Twin State Women's Network


Recently the house has grown very



Writes KEITH C. DANGLEIS '91, "I'm back home in Denver working in private practice with a large multi-specialty radiology group. I'm having a


